Dear Commanding Officer:

On February 1, 2007, the Washington State Department of Ecology (Ecology) received a Joint Aquatic Resources Permit Application (JARPA) from NAS Whidbey Island requesting a Section 401 Water Quality Certification for placement of concrete erosion revetment mats over a 6600 square foot area on the shoreline of Ault Field. A public notice regarding the request was distributed by Ecology for the above-referenced project pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 173-225 WAC on May 16, 2007.

On behalf of the State of Washington, through the enclosed Order, Ecology certifies that the work described in the original JARPA submitted on February 1, 2007, and in the public notice (May 16, 2007) complies with applicable provisions of Sections 301, 302, 303, 306 and 307 of the Clean Water Act, as amended, and applicable state laws. This certification is subject to the conditions contained in the enclosed Order.

On May 16, 2007, Ecology also received a Certification of Consistency with the Washington State Coastal Zone Management Program (CZMP) form for this project from NAS Whidbey Island. Pursuant to Section 307(c)(3) of the Coastal Zone Management Act of 1972 as amended, Ecology concurs with NAS Whidbey Island's determination that the proposed work is consistent with Washington's CZMP. This concurrence is based upon NAS Whidbey Island's compliance with all applicable enforceable policies of the CZMP, including Section 401 of the CWA.





On February 1, 2007, Naval Air Station (NAS) Whidbey Island submitted a Joint Aquatic Resources Permit Application (JARPA) to the Department of Ecology (Ecology) requesting a Section 401 Water Quality Certification. A public notice regarding the request was distributed by Ecology for the above-referenced project pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 173-225 WAC on May 16, 2007.

The proposed project entails placement of concrete erosion revetment mats over a 6600 square foot (SF) area on the beach to protect the Navy's existing communication cables. The project is located on the shoreline of Ault Field, near the intersection of Franklin and Intruder Streets, NAS Whidbey Island, Island County, Washington. Section 21, Township 33N, Range 01E, WRIA #6, Island County Watershed.

The project proposes to install concrete erosion revetment mats over a 6600 square foot (SF) area on the Ault Field beach in the location of a steep bluff. Construction equipment will access the work area via an existing ramp once the ramp has been re-graded and built with four to six inch river rock or cobble. All equipment will be removed from the beach at the end of each work day or before the next high tide, whichever occurs first. The beach will be graded to just below beach grade prior to placing the mats then covered with native beach material. The concrete block articulated mat revetment will be keyed into the bluff and buried on each side. The end of the mat will be keyed into the sandbar waterward of the cobble zone.

AUTHORITIES:

In exercising authority under 33 U.S.C. § 1341, 16 U.S.C. § 1456, RCW 90.48.120, and RCW 90.48.260, Ecology has examined this application pursuant to the following:

1. Conformance with applicable water quality-based, technology-based, and toxic or pretreatment effluent limitations as provided under 33 U.S.C. §1311, 1312, 1313, 1316, and 1317 (FWPCA § 301, 303, 306 and 307);

2. Conformance with the state water quality standards contained in Chapter 173-201A WAC and authorized by 33 U.S.C. §1313 and by Chapter 90.48 RCW, and with other applicable state laws; and
3. Conformance with the provision of using all known, available and reasonable methods to prevent and control pollution of state waters as required by RCW 90.48.010.

WATER QUALITY CERTIFICATION CONDITIONS:

Through issuance of this Order, Ecology certifies that it has reasonable assurance that the activity as proposed and conditioned will be conducted in a manner that will not violate applicable water quality standards and other appropriate requirements of state law. In view of the foregoing and in accordance with 33 U.S.C. §1341, RCW 90.48.120, RCW 90.48.260 Chapter 173-200 WAC and Chapter 173-201A WAC, water quality certification is granted to the Applicant subject to the conditions within this Order.

Certification of this proposal does not authorize the Applicant to exceed applicable state water quality standards (Chapter 173-201A WAC), ground water standards (Chapter 173-200 WAC) or sediment quality standards (Chapter 173-204 WAC). Furthermore, nothing in this certification shall absolve the Applicant from liability for contamination and any subsequent cleanup of surface waters, ground waters or sediments occurring as a result of project construction or operations.

A. General Conditions

1. For purposes of this Order, the term "Applicant" shall mean (NAS) Whidbey Island and its agents, assignees and contractors.
2. For purposes of this Order, all submittals required by its conditions shall be sent to the Washington State Department of Ecology, Northwest Regional Office, Attn: 401/CZM Federal Permit Coordinator, 3190 160th Avenue SE, Bellevue, WA 98008-5452. Any submittals shall reference Order No. 4441 and Corps No. 200700180.
3. Work authorized by this Order is limited to the work described in the JARPA received by Ecology on February 1, 2007. The Applicant will be out of compliance with this Order and must reapply with an updated application if the information contained in the JARPA is voided by subsequent changes to the project not authorized by this Order.

4. Within 30 days of receipt of an updated JARPA Ecology will determine if the revised project requires a new water quality certification and public notice or if a modification to this Order is required.
5. This Order does not exempt, and is provisional upon compliance with other statutes and codes administered by federal, state, and local agencies.
6. Copies of this Order shall be kept on the job site and readily available for reference by Ecology personnel, the construction superintendent, construction managers and lead workers, and state and local government inspectors.
7. The Applicant shall provide access to the project site and all mitigation sites upon request by Ecology personnel for site inspections, monitoring, necessary data collection, and/or to ensure that conditions of this Order are being met.
8. Nothing in this Order waives Ecology's authority to issue additional orders if Ecology determines that further actions are necessary to implement the water quality laws of the state. Further, Ecology retains continuing jurisdiction to make modifications hereto through supplemental order, if additional impacts due to project construction or operation are identified (*e.g.*, violations of water quality standards, downstream erosion, etc.), or if additional conditions are necessary to further protect water quality.
9. The Applicant shall ensure that all appropriate project engineers and contractors at the project site have read and understand relevant conditions of this Order and all permits, approvals, and documents referenced in this Order. The Applicant shall provide Ecology a signed statement from each project engineer and contractor that they have read and understand the conditions of this Order and the above-referenced permits, plans, documents and approvals. These statements shall be provided to Ecology before construction begins at the project.
10. This Order does not authorize direct, indirect, permanent, or temporary impacts to waters of the state or related aquatic resources, except as specifically provided for in conditions of this Order.
11. Any person who fails to comply with any provision of this Order shall be liable for a penalty of up to ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) per violation for each day of continuing noncompliance.

B. Water Quality

1. This Order does not authorize temporary exceedances of the turbidity standard beyond the limits established in WAC 173-201A-210(1)(e)(i)(D).

C. Construction Conditions

1. All work in and near the water shall be done so as to minimize turbidity, erosion, and other water quality impacts. Construction stormwater, sediment, and erosion control Best Management Practices (BMP's) suitable to prevent exceedances of state water quality standards shall be in place before starting clearing, filling and grading work and shall be maintained throughout construction.
2. The project shall be clearly marked/staked prior to construction. Clearing limits, travel corridors and stockpile sites shall be clearly marked. Sensitive areas and buffers that are to be protected from disturbance shall be marked so as to be clearly visible to equipment operators. Equipment shall enter and operate within the marked clearing limits corridors and stockpile areas.

D. Timing Requirements

1. This Order is valid until April 20, 2009.

E. Notification Requirements

1. The Applicant shall provide written notification (FAX: 425-649-7098, e-mail: cynt461@ecy.wa.gov) or mail to Ecology's 401/CZM Federal Permit Coordinator, Northwest Regional Office, 3190 160th Avenue SE, Bellevue, WA 98008-5452, in writing at least three (3) days prior to the start of construction at the project site.
2. The Applicant shall provide written notification to Ecology's Northwest Regional Office Federal Permit Coordinator in writing within fourteen (14) days after completion of construction.

NOTE: These notifications shall include the Applicant's name, project name, project location, the number of this Order, contact and contact's phone number.

F. Emergency/Contingency Measures

1. The Applicant shall develop a spill prevention and containment plan for this project, and shall have spill cleanup materials and an emergency call list available on site.
2. Any work that is out of compliance with the provisions of this Order, or conditions causing distressed or dying fish, or any discharge of oil, fuel, or chemicals into state waters, including wetlands, or onto land with a potential for entry into state waters, is prohibited. If these occur, the Applicant or operator shall immediately take the following actions:
 - a. Cease operations that are causing the compliance problem.
 - b. Assess the cause of the water quality problem and take appropriate measures to correct the problem and/or prevent further environmental damage.

- c. In the event of finding distressed or dying fish, the applicant shall collect fish specimens and water samples in the affected area within the first hour of the event. These samples shall be held in refrigeration or on ice until the applicant is instructed by Ecology on what to do with them. Ecology may require analyses of these samples before allowing the work to resume.
 - d. In the event of a discharge of oil, fuel, or chemicals into state waters, or onto land with a potential for entry into state waters, containment and cleanup efforts shall begin immediately and be completed as soon as possible, taking precedence over normal work. Cleanup shall include proper disposal of any spilled material and used cleanup materials.
 - e. Immediately notify Ecology's 24-Hour Spill Response Team at 1-800-258- 5990 of the nature of the problem, any actions taken to correct the problem, and any proposed changes in operations to prevent further problems.
3. Fuel hoses, oil drums, oil or fuel transfer valves and fittings, etc., shall be checked regularly for drips or leaks, and shall be maintained and stored properly to prevent spills into state waters, including wetlands.
 4. If at any time during work the proponent finds buried chemical containers, such as drums, or any unusual conditions indicating disposal of chemicals, the proponent shall immediately notify Ecology's 24-Hour Spill Response Team at 1-800-258-5990.

G. Appeal Process

You have the right to appeal this Order to the Pollution Control Hearings Board. Pursuant to chapter 43.21B RCW, your appeal must be filed with the Pollution Control Hearings Board, and served on the Department of Ecology within thirty (30) days of the date of your receipt of this document.

To appeal this Order, your notice of appeal must contain a copy of the Ecology Order you are appealing.


