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| | | | <p><u>(c) The fee for the services of the professional archaeologist or historic preservationist shall be paid by the applicant.</u></p> <p><u>(2) If the site assessment identifies the presence of archaeological, or significant historic, cultural resources, recommendations shall be prepared by a professional archaeologist or historic preservation professional, as part of the survey/assessment. In the preparation of such plans, the professional archaeologist or historic preservation professional shall solicit comments from DAHP and [affected Tribe(s)].</u></p> <p><u>(3) A site survey/assessment shall contain the following minimum elements:</u></p> <p><u>(a) The purpose of the project; a site plan for proposed on-site development; including indication of any existing building or structures on-site as well as any that are proposed for removal; depth and location of all ground disturbing activities including, but not limited to, utilities, paved areas, clearing and grading, landscaping or new landscape features (i.e. fencing, walls, etc.); an examination of project on-site design alternatives; and an explanation of why the proposed activity requires a location on, or access across and/or through, an historic or archaeological resource; and</u></p> <p><u>(b) A description of the historic/archaeological resources present, including any building or structure over 40 years of age affected by the proposal; and</u></p> <p><u>(c) An analysis of the significance of the historic resource and an analysis of the potential adverse impacts as a result of the activity;</u></p> <p><u>(d) An analysis of how these impacts will be/have been avoided; or</u></p> <p><u>(e) A recommendation of appropriate mitigation measures if the resources cannot be avoided. Some mitigation measure may require a permit from DAHP. In the case of archaeological resources mitigation measures may include but are not limited to the following:</u></p> <p><u>(i) Recording the site with DAHP, or listing the site in the National Register of Historic Places, Washington Heritage Register, as applicable, or any locally developed historic registry formally adopted by the County;</u></p> | |

11.	18.16.860 (126)	Definitions	<p>126. "Substantial improvement" means any rehabilitation, repair, reconstruction, addition, or other improvement of a building when the cost of the improvement equals or exceeds 50 percent of the market value of the building before start of construction of the improvement. The term includes buildings that have incurred substantial damage or damage of any origin sustained by a building when the cost of restoring the building to its pre-damaged condition would equal or exceed 50 percent of the market value before the damage occurred. Substantial improvement does not include any project for improvement of a structure to correct existing violations of state or local health, sanitary, or safety code specifications, which have been identified by the local code enforcement official and are the minimum necessary to ensure safe living conditions or any alteration of a historic structure, provided that the alteration will not <u>adversely affect the structure's historic character-defining features and is determined to meet the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation</u> (https://www.nps.gov/tps/standards/rehabilitation.htm). preclude the structure's continued designation as a historic structure.</p>	
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
