

Per Capita Income for Counties in Washington State

For oversight and independent remedial action grants, Ecology may fund up to 75% of the eligible project costs if the applicant is “economically disadvantaged.” Under the rule proposal, a county is defined to be “economically disadvantaged” if its per capita income is equal to or below the median county per capita income based on the latest official American Community Survey five-year estimates of the U.S. Department of Commerce. The data below are the estimates for 2008-2012.
