

NPDES WAG993000 requires that the Washington State Department of Agriculture (WSDA) submit an annual freshwater emergent weed monitoring plan to the Washington State Department of Ecology (WSDOE).

WSDA plans to monitor a subset of imazamox, bispyribacsodium, penoxsulam, flumioxazin, or carfentrazone-ethyl applications if the agency or its limited agents propose to use these active ingredients under the permit. WSDA will use the WSDOE on-line permit application database to identify entities requesting to use the above products and then develop specific monitoring goals when the information becomes available. WSDA will submit an updated monitoring plan to Ecology if any of these chemicals are proposed for use in 2012.
